### Patent Cooperation Treaty (PCT): international patent applications

A few statistics for 2001 to help understand the scope:

104,000 applications processed by the International Bureau [average of 100 pages in each application file, therefore a total of over 10 million pages stored on paper]

received exclusively on paper except for:
PCT Request form (paper and diskette, using PCT-EASY software)
DNA sequence listings part (only CD, or paper + CD)

117,000 applications published or re-published [average of 35 pages per published application, for a total of over 65 million pages printed and distributed]

except for certain DNA sequence listings parts (correspond to tens or hundreds of thousands of pages) published only on the WIPO Website in electronic form



## Patent Cooperation Treaty (PCT): handling of PCT patent applications in the future

For the future: Electronic filing and processing

First phase: establish a paperless system
(PCT Automation Project "IMPACT")
inside of WIPO
currently in the last year of completion and deployment

#### Second phase:

receive applications filed electronically according to the E-filing standard ("PCT-SAFE") but only after completion of first phase expected for the first half of 2003

 IMPACT: Information Management for the PAtent Cooperation Treaty PCT-SAFE: Secure Applications Filed Electronically



#### E-filing international standard (PCT-SAFE)

- General legal basis in the PCT Regulations
- Legal framework and technical standard: entered into force on January 7, 2002 now called "PCT-SAFE"
- New flexible mechanism just introduced for adapting legal framework and technical standard, as needed, with consultation via WIPO Website
- Today, not yet in use
- PCT Offices should start to be ready to accept filings:

certain PCT receiving Offices : sometime in 2002

the International Bureau : first half of 2003

Scope: currently 115 Contracting States and over 90 Offices



#### **PCT Automation Project – IMPACT**

Several phases corresponding to various functions of the International Bureau, including:

new approach to internal processing of dossiers

- via creation of processing teams

scanning office

automated international publication

systematic communication of documents to PCT Offices

availability of documents

- from a digital library (IPDL), such as WIPOnet



### E-filing and processing under the Patent Law Treaty (PLT)

- PLT adopted in June 2001, not yet entered into force
- PLT Regulations permit a Contracting Party, after June 2, 2005 to exclude the filing of communications on paper
- <u>PCT</u> legal framework and technical standard are applicable to national and regional patent applications which will be filed in the context of the PLT, in the various national and regional Offices:
  - software may vary from one Office to another
  - but they must be compatible



## E-filing and processing under the future Trademark Law Treaty (TLT)

- Approach very similar to that introduced in the Patent Law Treaty (PLT)
- will be discussed
- for the first time in the context of the next session of the Standing Committee on the Law of Trademarks (SCT)
- at the end of May 2002



#### **Madrid Agreement and Protocol – Marks**

- Since 1992, applications received from national Offices are scanned upon receipt at the International Bureau
- Bibliographic data is captured and available electronically
- Subsequent documents are also scanned
- All paper copies are destroyed on average after two months
- Communications by the International Bureau to national Offices are still made on paper
- Volume concerned in 2001:

24,000 applications 85,000 refusal notifications 6,000 renewals 50,000 requests for recordal of changes of ownership
